

## National speaker motivates students

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JONESBORO — Professional speaker Paul Vitale told junior high students they were influencing him even as he spoke, and he encouraged them to channel their influential power.

"You're influencing me and my message by paying attention," he said. "I'm only as good as you."

On Tuesday, Vitale asked students of Annie Camp Junior High to dare to dream courageously; empower others to imagine; unite through a common bond and be resilient like none other.

The founder of Vital Communications and author of three best sellers led students through a series of demonstrations. A fourman push-up illustrated the point that "we can't do it alone."

Vitale told two eighthgrade boys who performed the push-up that they have a "big presence" at school. "That makes you role models," he said.

He emphasized the importance of education. "If you continue the process of education, then you will be successful," he said. "Your grades right now matter."

After the assembly Vitale visited with a select group of students during a break-out

session in which he listened to individual struggles.

"There are those who want to kick you. They'll tell you that you're not smart enough and you're not good-looking enough, but I think we all look pretty good today," he said.

He said that for seven years he was tutored for a learning disability. He took the ACT test four times, with a high score of 18 paving the way to college.

Vitale worked through several remedial classes at the University of Central Arkansas before he graduated with a degree in mass communications and journalism.

Vitale's best sellers are Are You Puzzled by the Puzzle of Life?, Sell with Confidence and Pass It On.

The Russellville native developed "A Hero Within: Today's Youth, Tomorrow's Leaders," a program to help youth overcome obstacles and achieve success.

Vitale said he was encouraged Tuesday by student participation and their willingness to offer opinions.

"Their challenges range from fear of failure to dealing with stress, anxiety and loneliness...! think their optimism and the realization that they can overcome obstacles was really refreshing."
